The briefing provided background about the ten year plan to end homelessness. In 2004 and 2005 citizens approved \$27.8 million in bond funds to design, build, and create a new permanent supportive housing for the homeless. In 2008 City Council contracted with the Metro Dallas Homeless Alliance (MDHA) to operate the facility.

With the new facility crime decreased in business robbery, burglary and accessory theft. Unfortunately crime increased in individual robbery, aggravated assault and other theft. This report does include individuals stealing from one another at the shelter.

The Bridge has placed 476 people in permanent employment and 216 in permanent housing. Challenges did arise when unplanned courtyard sleeping resulted in diminished resources, higher costs of security and unmanageable caseloads. Lack of storage space for clients resulted in the disposal of personal property of some guests. Resolutions such as partnering with facilities to

assist with moving people to alternative shelters for overnight sleeping and agreeing to check bags for medication and personal items have been set into place. Additional challenges include functionality concerns, contractor involved solutions, ongoing maintenance and maintenance training.

Next steps are to continue an ongoing review of the expenses of MDHA, develop goals with MDHA and other agencies as specified in the contract, and work diligently with MDHA

A review of the existing codes and ordinances related to trees and urban forestry was conducted to determine changes needed. Many departments participate in the Current Urban Forestry programs including Streets, Public Works & Transportation, Dallas Water Utilities, Development Services, Office of Environmental Quality, Building Inspection, Code Compliance, Trinity River Project, Strategic Customer Services and Police.

The Park and Recreation Department has a City Forester that is involved with partnering with the Texas Food Services, training, Tree City USA designation, the Mayor's Urban Forest Advisory Committee, public outreach and education, making recommendations to the City, public tree planting projects and Arbor Day events.

Challenges ahead are to have consistent services citywide, pro-active versus re-active urban forest management, and the implementation of a Trinity Forest Management Plan.
