

Library patrons can login to the service from any computer in the world with internet access or through an app for smartphones and tablets.

WHAT IS JAZZ APPRECIATION MONTH?

Jazz Appreciation Month, set in April every year, is intended to draw public attention to the glories of jazz as both an historical and a living treasure. The idea is to encourage musicians, concert halls, schools, colleges, museums, libraries, jazz presenters and public broadcasters to offer special programs on jazz every April.

In August, 2003 at the behest of the Smithsonian the U.S. Congress passed legislation which was signed by the President: Public Law 108-72, declaring:

- "(1) the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of American History should be commended for establishing a Jazz Appreciation Month; and
- (2) musicians, schools, colleges, libraries, concert halls, museums, radio and television stations, and other organizations should develop programs to explore, perpetuate, and honor jazz as a national and world treasure."

The purpose of Jazz Appreciation Month is to draw greater public attention to the extraordinary heritage and history of jazz and its importance as an American cultural heritage. In addition, JAM is intended to stimulate the current jazz scene and encourage people of all ages to participate in jazz—to study the music, attend concerts, listen to jazz on radio and recordings, read books about jazz, and support institutional jazz programs. Organizations and communities all over the country are encouraged to participate in their own way.

In honor of this important national initiative, a number of jazz presenters, jazz educators and jazz supporters in Dallas came together to create a collective initiative which is now called D'JAM or Dallas Jazz Appreciation Month, and are presenting a series of events in April of 2013 highlighting and showcasing jazz in the greater Dallas community. This volunteer collective includes nonprofit arts groups, universities, festivals, Arts Magnet high schools, cultural centers, jazz clubs and churches.

GREAT DAY IN DALLAS POSTER





STEM jobs are projected to grow 2x faster than other jobs...







- January 2008 Selection of Thom Mayne as design architect
- June 2008 Five adult Perot children gift of \$50M in honor of their parents
- Summer 2009 Building designs unveiled
- November 2009 Groundbreaking of construction on site located at the corner of Field Street and Woodall Rodgers Freeway
- November 2011 Achieved fundraising goal of \$185M a year early
- Spring 2012 Major exhibit installation work began and continues throughout the year
- September 2012 Staff moved into the new building
