# Town Hall Meeting Statistics

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Between January 23<sup>rd</sup> and February 23<sup>rd</sup>, 36 town hall meetings were held to gather public input on community and citywide needs and priorities for the 2006 Capital Bond Program

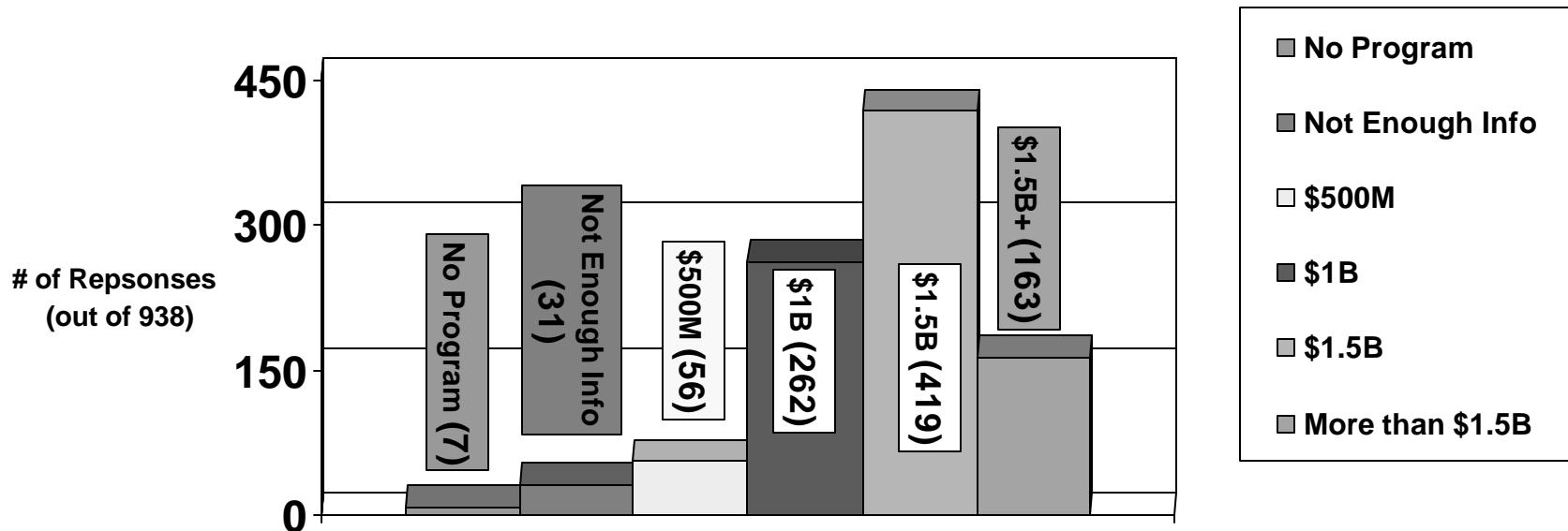
- ✍ Total Attendance: 1,604
- ✍ Average Attendance Per Meeting: 45 (for comparison, the *average budget town hall meeting attendance is 25*)
- ✍ Public Input via the internet: 117
- ✍ Project Suggestion Forms completed and returned (at meetings, by mail, or fax: 476)

Over 900 staff hours were utilized listening to our customers' input at these meetings

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# Town Hall Feedback on Size of Bond Program Supported



- Many citizens stressed that part of supporting a large bond program includes the expectation that funds will be used appropriately on worthwhile projects that will enhance the economic health of the City of Dallas.
- Feedback from Town Hall Meetings show that even districts with a relatively smaller backlogs of needs are supportive of a larger bond program that enhances the City and spurs economic development while shifting property tax burden from residential to commercial property owners.

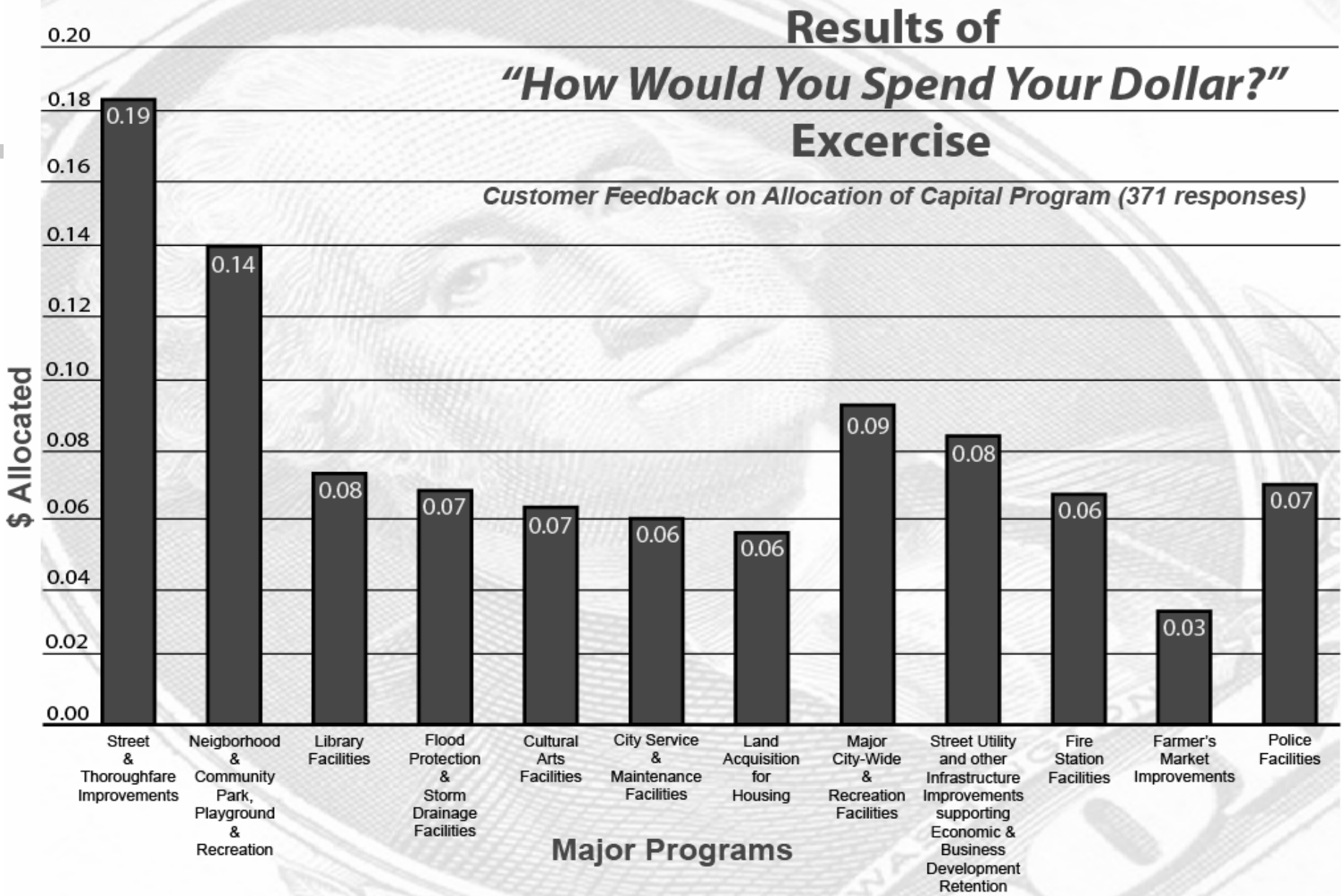

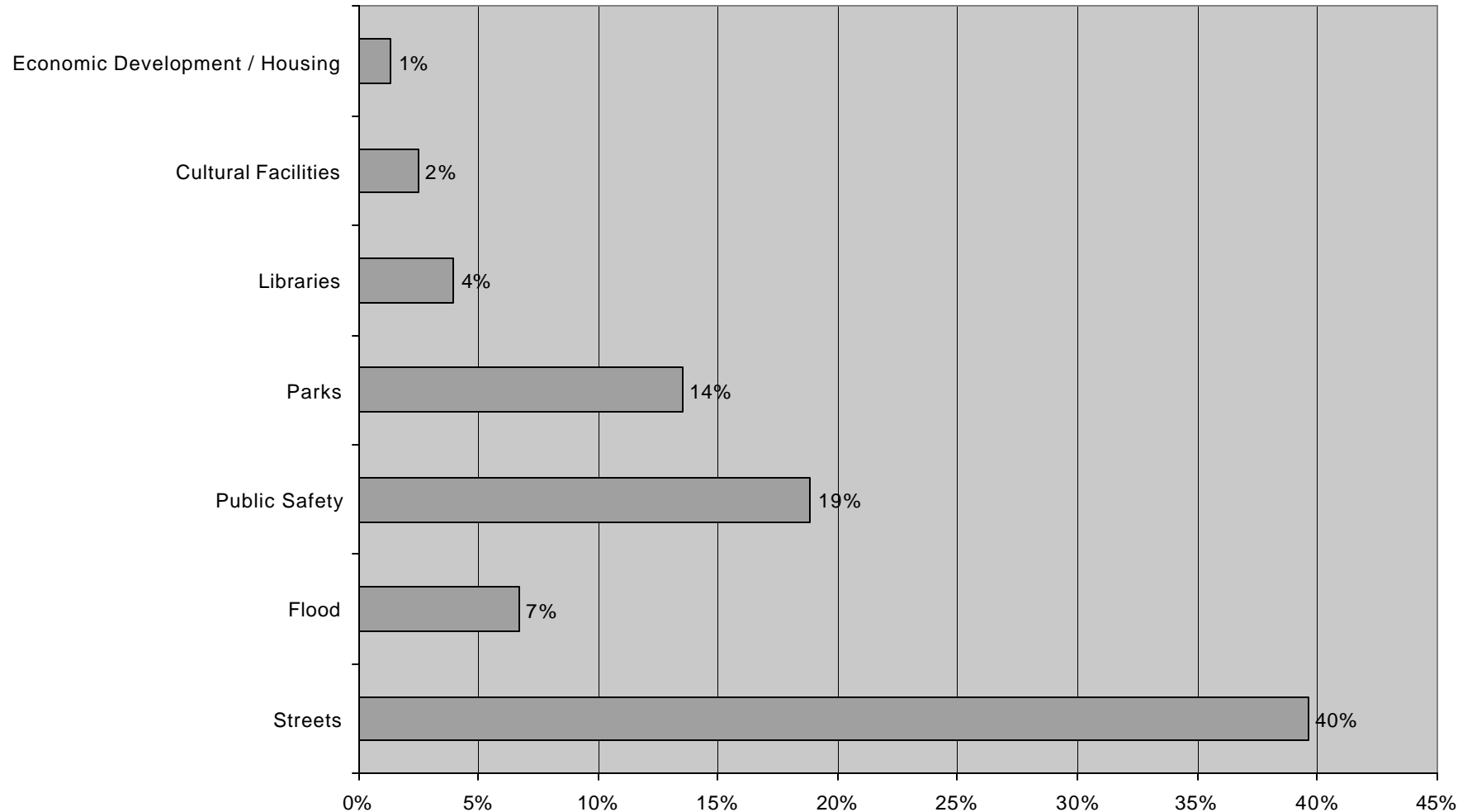
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# Historical Investments from 2003, 1998, 1995 Bond Programs

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# Guiding Principles

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1. Be customer focused
2. Address prudent portion of needs inventory with emphasis on projects that:
  - A. represent strategic investment in the economic health and future of our tax base
  - B. leverage development / redevelopment
3. Take advantage of leveraging and unique opportunities
4. Be transparent – provide good data on costs, capacity, etc.
5. Phase major projects where appropriate

# Guiding Principles

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- ✍ The list of projects in the Needs Inventory is valued at over \$7B and growing, as are project costs
- ✍ A significant segment of our customers have indicated their emphatic support for a program that would address 20% or more of the current needs inventory
- ✍ The City Manager is fully aware of the responsibility to recommend a prudent program that considers all on-going costs including O&M and other issues

# Guiding Principles

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The recommended program presented next month will be mindful of other pressing priorities in the annual O&M budget such as:

- ✍ additional police officers (the cost of 100 additional officers is approximately \$8 Million, or 1.2¢ on tax rate)
- ✍ additional O&M costs associated with the recommended project list
  - ✍ New libraries will need new librarians to staff them
  - ✍ New parks and recreation centers will need to be staffed and maintained
- ✍ other Council priorities in the annual budget
- ✍ personnel costs, salaries, health benefits, etc.

# Guiding Principles

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The recommended program will be based on ranked and scored projects, based on:

1. Technical criteria
2. Master Plans
3. Public input
4. Council's Key Focus Areas



# Inventory of Needs

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- You may recall that the Needs Inventory grew from \$6.4B in 2002 to \$7.2B in 2005
- Updates and revisions to the comprehensive Needs Inventory are still being finalized and will be delivered in two weeks as promised
- The April 19<sup>th</sup> briefing will provide more detail on why and how the total cost of needs/ wants/ opportunities has changed significantly over the past year

# Inventory of Needs

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*The Needs Inventory you see on April 19<sup>th</sup> will be different for a number of reasons*

- ✍ Cost estimates will be updated
- ✍ Escalation will be included in an attempt to address rising costs of material and other market conditions project in the out years of the program
- ✍ Projects eligible for general obligation bond funding will be discussed separately from non-G.O.-eligible projects (such as water, wastewater, aviation, and convention center)
- ✍ While all of these needs are part of the comprehensive Needs Inventory, the focus will be on the G.O.-Eligible projects
- ✍ New projects and opportunities that have come forth in the past year will also be included

# Inventory of Needs

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Examples of items not included a year ago are:

- Inland Port opportunities (\$25 - \$80M)
- Cotton Bowl opportunities (\$30 - \$50M)
- Woodall Rodgers Deck Park (\$15 - \$25M)
- Trinity Floodway Utility Relocation (\$15 - \$135.9M)

# Inventory of Needs

- The current \$7.2B in needs represents a considerable inventory
- The question has been raised, “What is the appropriate size of unfunded needs list?”
  - ✍ largely dependent upon policy decisions
  - ✍ include various factors and considerations for each of the various types of projects in the inventory
- The next several slides discuss suggested approaches to determine the level of investment in five core needs areas that represent the bulk of the inventory
  - City Facilities
  - Fire Facilities
  - Flood Protection / Storm Drainage
  - Park and Recreation
  - Street Improvements

# City Facilities Inventory

## Maintenance and Improvement of Existing Facilities

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- ✍ Failure to take care of facilities as they age has resulted in continued deterioration
- ✍ The Recommended 2006 Capital Bond Program will seek to strategically address major maintenance/ improvement needs that have been identified to date
- ✍ Identified needs total \$121.6M
  - ✍ 90 Roof replacement projects (\$18.6M)
  - ✍ 221 Major maintenance/ improvement projects (\$63.2M)
  - ✍ 6 Studies (\$1.4M)
  - ✍ 62 Renovation projects (\$38.4M)

# City Facilities Inventory

- ✍ Recommended Strategy
  - ✍ \$45 – 55M in 2006 bond funds to address 100% of roofs and 50% of rehab projects in priority order
  - ✍ 2010 bond funds - address remaining 50% rehab projects
  - ✍ Enhance **annual major maintenance** allocation to address projects that are not eligible for bond funds
  - ✍ **Resume and enhance Facility Asset Management Program to assess condition of every single city facility on bi-annual basis (similar to street assessment process)**
    - ✍ Address over 800 city facilities a significant portion of which are visited by citizens and other customers daily
    - ✍ Analyze expected useful life of building components
    - ✍ Forecast level of funding needed each year over useful life of each facility
    - ✍ Develop internal capacity to maintain the program
- ✍ The economic health of the city is enhanced by addressing these needs earlier than recent practice has been – preventing more costly solutions in the future

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# Fire Inventory

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- ✍ Fire-Rescue Department Master Plan was developed in 1973 and has been periodically updated by PWT and Fire Rescue staff
  
- ✍ Needs Inventory includes:
  - ✍ 25 replacement stations (\$167.2M)
  - ✍ 6 new fire stations (\$40.5M)
  - ✍ 5000 Dolphin Rd. Phase III (\$17.3M)
  - ✍ 1 station expansion (\$4.4M)
  - ✍ Major rehab (\$8.5M – incl \$3.4M to complete wash bay retrofits)

# Fire Inventory

- ✍ Many existing stations do not meet National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) recommended standards
- ✍ Our current Fire Station Building architectural program for new and replacement facilities accommodates NFPA standards and includes:
  - ✍ Approx. 12,000 square feet
  - ✍ 2 full and 2 half apparatus bays
  - ✍ On-site apparatus turnaround for backing equipment into bays
  - ✍ Parking spaces for 22 vehicles
  - ✍ Decontamination room, equipment clean room, ventilated equipment storage room, areas for administration, physical training, study, laundry, and gender separated shower, restrooms, and dormitory
  - ✍ Lobby with accessible public restroom



# Fire Inventory

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- ✍ \$65 – 75M per bond program for the next three bond programs could eliminate the Fire Facilities inventory
- ✍ Include seven of the 25 replacement stations, the expansion station, two of the six new stations and all of the major maintenance needs in the 2006 Capital Bond Program
- ✍ Address the remaining 18 replacement stations, four new stations, and Phase III of the Dolphin Rd complex in the next two bond programs

# Flood Protection / Storm Drainage Improvements Inventory

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- ✍ The \$890.9M represents immediate needs for the Flood Program
  - ✍ Erosion Control - \$23,687,611
  - ✍ Flood Management - \$483,622,313
  - ✍ Storm Drainage – \$383,613,568
- ✍ The major factors limiting full funding are financial capacity and the necessity to weigh these needs against all other needs
- ✍ We need to address this inventory as quickly as we can
- ✍ \$250 – 350M per bond program for the next three bond programs could eliminate the current inventory over the next 10-15 years

# Park Needs Inventory

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Three levels of improvements were established for the park needs by the Renaissance Plan:

Tier 1 – Recover existing park system

Tier 2 – Expand existing park system to address service gap deficiencies

Tier 3 – Responds to trends and new visions

# Tier 1 Needs

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- ✍ **Addresses deficiencies in current infrastructure**
  
- ✍ **100% of Tier 1 needs inventory is considered needs**
  
- ✍ **Examples of Tier 1 projects are:**
  - ✍ Playground Replacement
  - ✍ Trail Reconstruction
  - ✍ Historic Restoration
  - ✍ Erosion Control
  - ✍ Recreation Center Renovation/Reconstruction
  - ✍ Safety Improvement
  - ✍ Zoo Exhibits Renovation/Reconstruction
  - ✍ Athletic Field Restoration

# Tier 2 Needs

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- ✍ **Addresses service gaps for existing infrastructure**
- ✍ **80% of Tier 2 needs inventory is considered needs**
- ✍ **Examples of Tier 2 projects are:**
  - ✍ Recreation Center Expansion
  - ✍ Trail System Expansion
  - ✍ New Park Site Development
  - ✍ Land Acquisition
  - ✍ Athletic Complex

# Tier 3 Needs

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- ✍ **Addresses service gap and citizen priorities for recreational amenities currently not offered in Dallas**
  
- ✍ **25% of projects in Tier 3 is considered needs**
  
- ✍ **Examples of Tier 3 projects are:**
  - ✍ Skate Park
  - ✍ Multi-Generational Center
  - ✍ Cricket Field
  - ✍ Lacrosse Field
  - ✍ BMX Bike Course
  - ✍ Arboretum Expansion
  - ✍ White Water Course

# Recommended Strategy for Park Needs

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In order to complete the current Park and Recreation needs in 20 years, \$350M will be needed in the Park and Recreation component of the 2006 Capital Bond Program

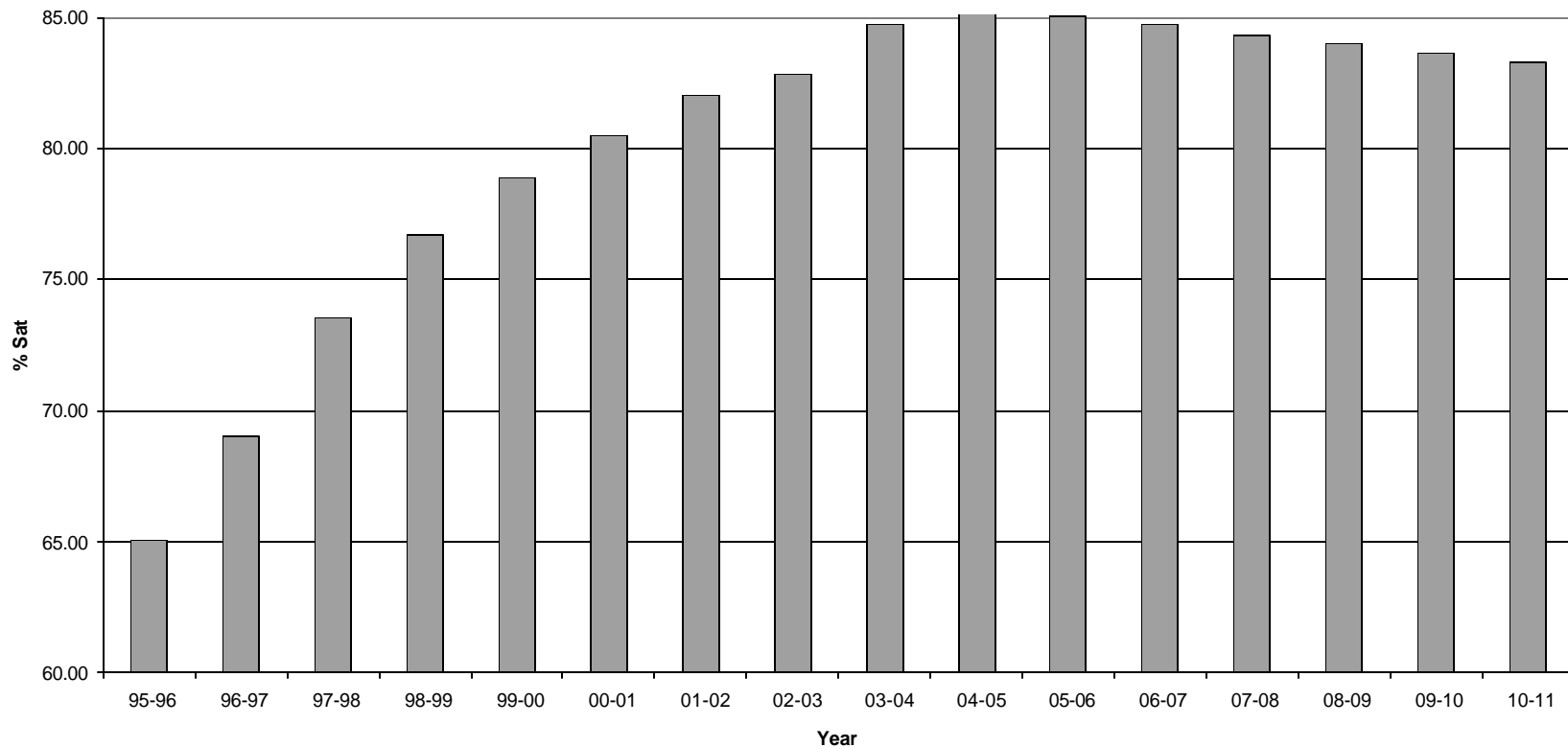
# Street Improvements Inventory

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- ✍ Street and Transportation Improvement needs cover a wide variety of types of projects as noted in the earlier Street and Transportation Needs briefing
- ✍ The following slides focus on street conditions, a key component of the Street and Transportation Improvements program

# Current Percent Satisfactory Rating is 85.4%

Projected %Sat without Synchronized O&M Program



The bulk of the improvements as a result of the 2003 Bond Program have occurred, and we will soon begin to see the rating decline.

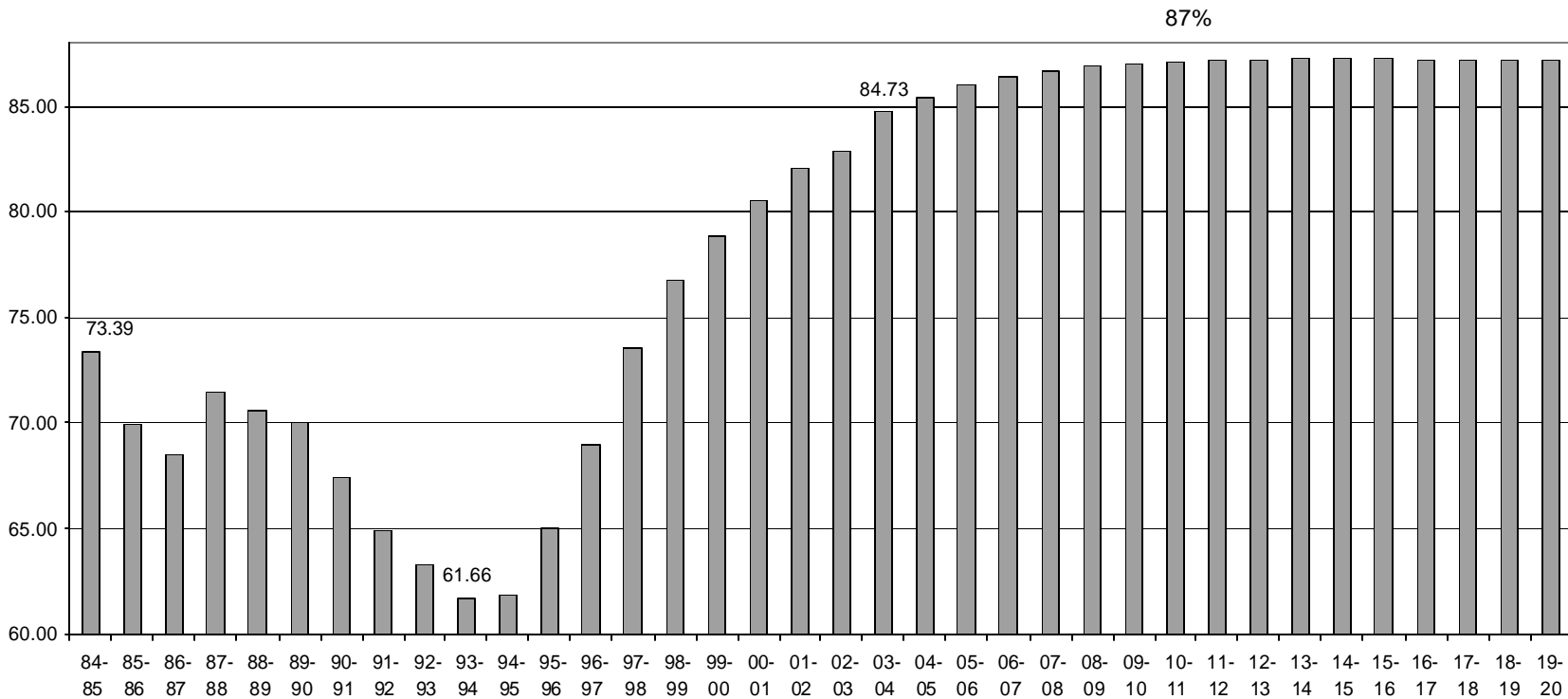
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# Street Improvements Inventory

- ✍ Recommend revising 2010 goal of 85% satisfactory to new goal of 87% satisfactory with minimum of 80% satisfactory in each council district at full implementation of the 06BP
  - ✍ Preliminary estimated cost of \$190M (575 lane-mi resurfacing, 80 lane-mi reconstruction)
  - ✍ Also requires additional O&M compared to current budget to maintain
  - ✍ The following slide provides more information on the O&M considerations for the Street Improvements program
- ✍ The objective of the recommended strategy is to avoid having any districts percent satisfactory streets level decline while enhancing each district to at least 80% using both capital and O&M treatments
- ✍ It costs 10 times as much to reconstruct a street than it does to resurface
- ✍ Recommended strategy focuses on preventing as many streets as possible from deteriorating from resurfacing-eligible to “reconstruction-required” by continuing to address street condition in both the capital and O&M programs
- ✍ The following slide provides an example of how the City might strategically link capital and O&M investments that in essence provides a framework for reducing capital needs over time (i.e. more preventive maintenance and resurfacing and less reconstruction)

# Projected Percent Satisfactory Rating with Enhanced 2006 Bond Program Resurfacing and Reconstruction **and** Synchronized O&M Program

%Sat History and Projections  
 (Assumes \$200M in Street Resurfacing and Reconstruction in the 2006 Capital Bond Program **and** synchronized O&M Program)



Suggested new goals increase the city-wide rating to 87% **with each** council district having a minimum rating of 80%. The synchronized and enhanced O&M program will prevent any district from falling below its current rating.

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# Synchronized and Enhanced Street O&M Program

- ✍ Expand crack sealing program
  - ✍ Newly resurfaced streets typically begin to develop cracks about two years after resurfacing
  - ✍ Useful lives of newly resurfaced streets can be extended by sealing those cracks to prevent surface water from penetrating to the base and sub-base and causing more extensive deterioration
  - ✍ \$800,000 for 4 additional crack sealing crews in addition to the current two crews
  
- ✍ Increase large pothole repairs, full-depth repairs, level-ups, and base failure repairs - \$1.7M

# Synchronized and Enhanced Street O&M Program

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- ✍ Double Partial Reconstruction lane miles
  - ✍ Street Services staff currently perform partial reconstruction to extend the useful lives of street segments not requiring full reconstruction and for localized segments in very poor condition
  - ✍ Additional 26 Lane Miles is \$2.1M (\$80,000 per lane mile)
- ✍ Total \$4.6M plus one time equipment costs of approximately \$630k
  - ✍ \$280,000 for crack sealing equipment
  - ✍ \$350,000 for concrete repair equipment

# Needs in Other Program Areas

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- ✍ Cultural Facilities – needs primarily driven by private investment leveraged and economic impact
- ✍ Library Facilities – needs primarily addressed through the Library Master Plan
- ✍ Police Facilities – the remaining needs in this area are related to the Police Academy Complex
- ✍ Economic Development – needs in this area are primarily driven by economic impact, effect on the ratio of commercial to residential property tax base, and private investment leveraged



# In closing . . .

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- ✍ *There are many issues to consider in developing the recommended program*
  - ✍ *Public input*
  - ✍ *Technical criteria and master plans*
  - ✍ *Council's Key Focus Areas*
  - ✍ *New and unique opportunities*
- ✍ *We must also be mindful that the capital bond program is but one component of the City's overall budget*
- ✍ *A host of O&M priorities such as additional police officers, and employees to staff and maintain new and expanded capital facilities have to be considered*

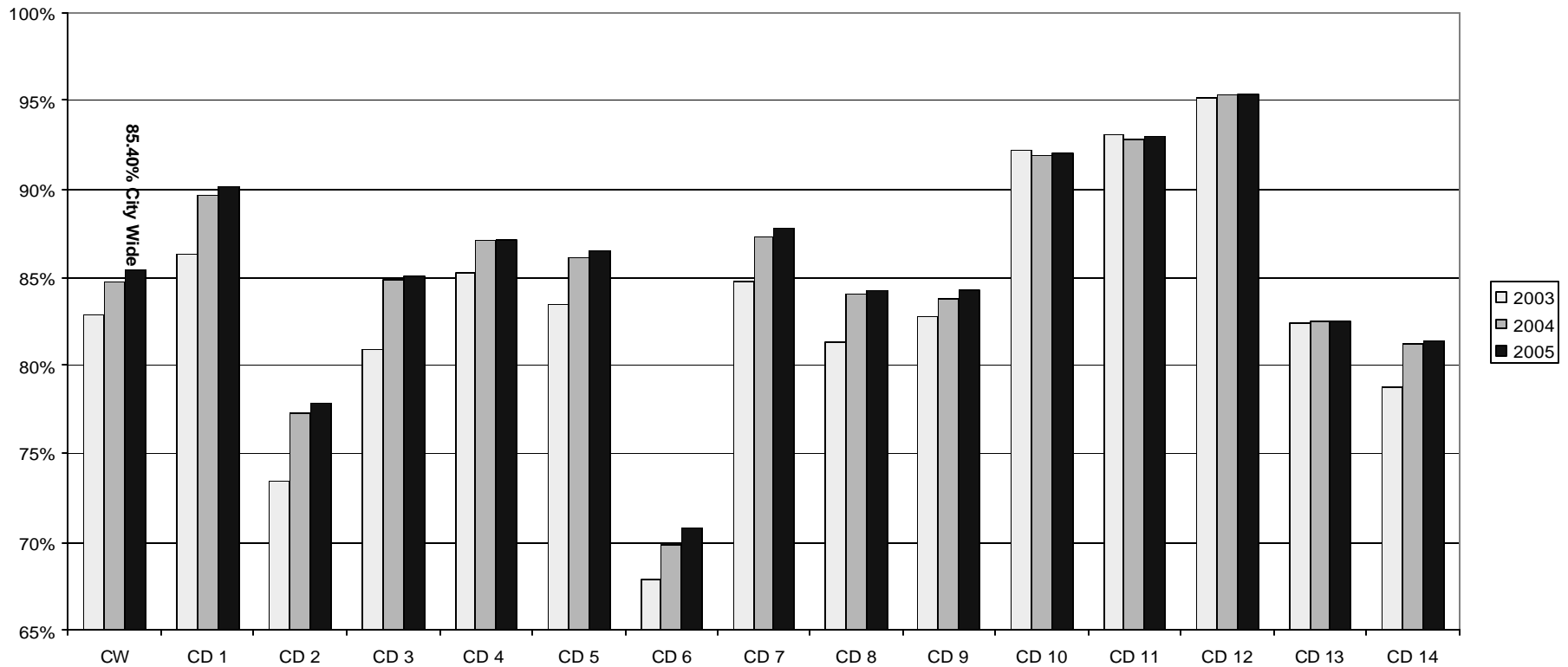
